









Soon after the Oregon Chapter was formed in 1964, members involved with management of coastal areas expressed concern for the continuing loss of estuarine areas to diking and filling. In 1967, the Estuaries Committee (now the Estuary Conservation and Development Committee) was formed. Known informally as the SOBs (for Save Our Bays), the Committee launched a public education campaign and kept an eye on estuarine developments. This effort by the Oregon Chapter to further protection of thenvulnerable important Oregon aquatic resources started a tradition of resource responsibility outside of normal jurisdictions that continues in the Chapter today.














**1971:** ORAFS provided a Neutral Forum for Oregon Game Commission, Oregon Fish Commission, US Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, the US Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, and Tribal Fisherman to discuss Fisheries Management Allocations between commercial and sport interests, and to discuss conservation of native fish stocks Five Major New Federal Regulatory Mandates Changed the Playing Field in the 1970's: 1. National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA-1970) requiring Environmental Analysis.

- The requirement for EAs and EIS's took years and law suits to be fully implemented, but eventually led to many Federal agencies hiring fisheries biologists to comply.
- 2. Clean Water Act (1972, strengthened in 1977 and 1987) regulated toxic discharges.
- Clean Water Act, Section 404 (1972) regulating fill and removal of materials into and from waterways. Empowered states and tribes to help implement.
- 3. Oregon Forest Practices Act (1972) regulate forest activities and required buffer strips.
- 4. Endangered Species Act (1973) also was slow to implement, but was a major tool to strengthen protection of Oregon fish stocks (see 1990s).
- 5. Magnuson Act in 1976 created a coastal 200-mile economic (exclusive) fishery zone, mandated US observers on foreign fishing boats, and greatly increased concern for and data on US marine fish stocks.

1982: Dave Buchanan and Dan Bottom question the use of the insecticide Sevin to kill burrowing mud shrimp in Tillamook Estuary at the request of oyster growers due to immediate and delayed mortality and harm to a wide variety of non-target estuarine organisms. Peer reviews of their controversial stance by ORAFS Water Resources Committee elevated the discussion. The courts ruled in April 1984 that a state land use regulation protecting estuaries was violated, and that there was a lack of data on the impacts to non-target organisms. Today it remains illegal to spray insecticides onto Oregon estuaries.






**1990:** Following the Annual Meeting, ExCom members voted to join OR Trout et al. as co-petitioners to list Snake River Chinook under the ESA. Snake River Chinook were listed as "Threatened" under the Endangered Species Act April 22, 1992.

**1990:** ORAFS members organized a 14 member Watershed Classification and Aquatic Biodiversity Subcommittee to develop criteria for identifying critical watersheds (known as "aquatic diversity areas"). Their criteria, data bases, and maps of key watersheds were distributed to 85 professionals, then were incorporated (anonymously) into regional conservation plans including the President's Northwest Forest Plan.







**1991:** "Pacific Salmon at the Crossroads: Stocks at Risk from CA, OR, ID, and WA by Nehlsen, Williams, and Lichatowich was published in Fisheries highlighting the poor condition of 214 native, naturally spawning stocks of salmon and steelhead. This stimulated a host of ESA petitions.

**1992:** Filed a federal ESA petition to list bull trout in Klamath Basin. Bull trout were listed as "Threatened" throughout the west in 1998 and Klamath bull trout were recognized as a distinct population segment.






**2000:** On February 17<sup>th</sup> ORAFS adopted a resolution on Snake river salmon and steelhead recovery resolving that based on the best scientific information available:

- 1. The four lower Snake River dams are a significant threat to the continued existence of remaining Snake River salmon and steelhead stocks;
- 2. If society-at-large wishes to restore these salmonids to sustainable, fishable levels, a significant portion of the lower Snake River must be returned to a free-flowing condition by breaching the four lower Snake River dams, and that this action must happen soon;
- 3. Substantive actions to address detrimental impacts associated with harvest management, hatchery practices, and habitat alteration will be required of all concerned people, including us as responsible professionals, to further increase the likelihood of recovering Snake River salmon and steelhead stocks; and
- 4. The Oregon Chapter of the AFS will continue to assist agencies and the public



**2003:** ORAFS provided comments on the proposed critical habitat designations for west coast salmon and steelhead including: "We applaud NOAA Fisheries' efforts to undertake such an extensive and comprehensive task in a short timeframe, but we do not support some of the methodology and the outcome of greatly reduced critical habitat."




# 2021:

- In late 2021 the Albert G. Lassuy Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion endowment was created.


# 2022


